



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

Supportive Services for Veteran Families

Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) is a homeless prevention and rapid rehousing program designed to help Veterans and their families maintain their current housing, or help find them new and affordable housing. VSC remains a leader in five

LaTanya Walters, Army Veteran from Charlotte, North Carolina found herself behind on rent after a series of family hardships. After reaching out to other community resources and coming up empty, she was then connected with Veterans Services of the Carolinas where she received housing prevention services with our Supportive Services for Veteran Families program.

With the help of VSC, LaTanya received the necessary financial support to avoid eviction from her home. After LaTanya's car broke down, she was relying on friends to take her back and forth to work.

Unbeknownst to her, LaTanya's case manager, Tiffany Martin, was working behind the scenes with Fred and Brenda Denton, a family who wanted to donate their Dodge Van to a Veteran in need.

LaTanya was overjoyed to learn that she would be the recipient of the van. Through this joint effort and gracious donation, LaTanya has been successful in maintaining her housing and employment.

The Homeless Veteran Reintegration Program (HVRP) serves homeless Veterans who need assistance to enter, re-enter, remain, or advance in the workforce. Through short-term training programs, which focus on industry recognized certifications and licenses, HVRP is committed to ensuring Veterans receive the training and support needed to secure career level jobs that pay living wages.

to be successful as an electrician.

When VSC case manager, Amanda Perez,

first met Jerell Steward, he identified many

barriers that were preventing him to obtaining employment.

He stated a lack of transportation, no income, no cell phone,

no professional clothing for interviews or employment, no tools/equipment, and a weak support system (family, friends, community) were hindering him from being able to attend a job interview or be employable.

Quickly after his enrollment with HVRP, what Jerell thought was impossible, became possible for him. With the use of HVRP funding, Amanda was able to purchase him a cell phone and phone card, a 30-day bus pass, and utilized LYFT to get him to interviews/screenings that were not on a bus route. Jerell has the skills and experience as an electrician, he needed the resources provided by Veterans Services of the Carolinas along with intensive case management to be able to make it to job interviews and become employable. Jerell received a job offer within a month of enrollment as an electrician, with an hourly rate of \$20.00, full time, with benefits. As a requirement for his career, VSC was able to purchase the tools and clothing needed for Jerell



NCServes Western is the region's first coordinated network of public, private and nonprofit organizations working together to serve the community. This team connects Veterans, service members and their families to these resources across 21 human service needs.

Marine Veteran, Chris Robertson, came to VSC through a referral from American Red Cross where he was being served due to an unexpected house fire that left him in despair.

Referrals were put into the network starting with ABCCM Crisis Ministry; which was able to provide the Veteran and his spouse clothing and food during this difficult transition.

In addition he was connected to Homeward Bound which placed him in permanent housing within their Veterans SSVF program.

Chris is currently working on employment with Goodwill Industries and VA Benefits with the Buncombe County Veterans Service Office. He is currently a participant in the Buncombe County Veterans Treatment Court, where he is supported by a team of peers and professionals. During the process and through a generous donation he received a bike from the ABCCM warehouse. This bike has improved this Veterans transportation means immensely. Overall, Mr. Robertson has been supported by ten different community providers addressing his overall health and well-being and VSC will continue to walk alongside him as he transforms his life.

In January 2019, VSC partnered with WVPM 103.7 AVL radio in Asheville, North Carolina and the NCServes Radio show was born. This show broadcasts various resources, highlights providers, and interviews Veterans in the community on topics important to military families. In addition to being broadcast within a 50 mile radius of Asheville, NC, it is also streamed live on VSC social media outlets.

Homeless Outreach Partnership for Empowerment (HOPE) is a program designed to provide outreach to individuals with severe mental illness who are living outside and are deemed most vulnerable. Veterans are located through extensive outreach efforts extended by the HOPE team. HOPE staff assists eligible Veterans by referring them to mental health treatment and resources, primary health and dental care, as well as income assistance, employment, and housing.


