




NCServes Western currently serves counties across Western North Carolina and partners with 97 community providers to identify resources for our Veterans and their families across 21 human services needs. 

UNRECOGNIZABLE

Working with Veterans takes a community effort and often times multiple resources and partners in order to instill hope and give a new lease on life. Seldom are all four VSC programs utilized with success on one individual. This past summer we witnessed this occurrence with US Marine Corps Veteran Stephen Coffee.

Our HOPE outreach team identified Stephen while conducting outreach with one of our community partners in Waynesville, NC. He had been experiencing chronic homelessness for 10 years after returning from multiple deployments to Afghanistan. After several engagements with him, our HOPE program was able to connect him to mental health services and our NCServes Coordination Center team.


From there, the NCServes program supported him with food, clothing and social supports through our community providers. In addition, Stephen was enrolled into our SSVF Housing program. Immediately, the team was able to remove him from the streets and put him into a hotel, while we utilized CARES funding and worked for a more long-term solution. During his two month stay in a hotel, Stephen stated that this time was most beneficial for him as it supported his transition from homelessness. Stephen worked with our Case Manager, Jill Carter to locate permanent housing through our SSVF program. In August Stephen moved into his new apartment and with the support from NCServes received household items and beds.

Stephen is currently self-employed as a handy man, however he was recently enrolled into our HVRP employment program. He is now considering getting trained to help other Veterans as a Peer Support Specialist.

In a recent interview, Stephen stated "My life 6 months ago compared to now is unrecognizable. I am now able to be a father to my son, which is my best accomplishment through this entire process".

HOUSING SERVICES **Supportive Services for Veteran Families**

Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) is a homeless prevention and rapid rehousing program designed to help Veterans and their families maintain their current housing, or help find them new and affordable housing, VSC remains a leader in seven Continuums of Care across North Carolina and remains active in Coordinated Entry. Through the integration of NCServes this past year, the SSVF team increased the enrollment rate by 20%.

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ONGOING COVID-19 RESPONSE

In response to the COVID-19 Pandemic, the VSC team is working tirelessly with the VA and community partners to provide a sense of security to our Veterans during these difficult times. One of our immediate solutions is working alongside 25 local hotels to provide homeless Veterans with safe and stable emergency housing during state mandates. This promotes our Veterans' health and well-being as they strive toward self sufficiency.

TAKING A LEAP OF FAITH

Navy Veteran Jessica Case reached out to VSC in early August 2020 to see what resources may be available for her and her children. She had limited income to resolve her crisis on her own. This one call proved to be more than she planned for as she reached a fellow Veteran and NCServes Senior Care Coordinator Brandon Davis, who genuinely cared about her and her children's well-being. Brandon connected her with the SSVF Housing program and she was provided emergency housing and food within hours of her call.

With the assistance of SSVF, Jessica was very motivated to identify permanent housing that met her and her children's needs. Jessica searched for housing, and was accepted for a brand new 2 bedroom unit in October 2020. SSVF assisted with the security deposit, rent, utility deposits, beds and bedding, food, cleaning supplies, and household goods.

With the stability of housing and food provided by SSVF, Jessica was finally able to work on educational and employment goals she had abandoned years previously. Jessica utilized the HVRP Employment Program to help her pay for tuition, uniform, background check, books, and NHA examination fees, so that she could obtain her Phlebotomy Certification. Jessica graduated and became a Nationally Certified Phlebotomist in December 2020.

SSVF also connected Jessica with the HUD-VASH program in order for her to receive long term housing and VA support as she continues to work on her educational and employment goals. This will also provide Jessica the opportunity to home school her children during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Jessica stated, "To start over with nothing was the scariest thing I have ever done in my life. By having someone to problem solve with and be there with each step providing guidance and resources encouraged and empowered me into changing my life."

EMPLOYMENT SERVICES Homeless Veteran Reintegration Program

The Homeless Reintegration Program (HVRP) serves homeless Veterans who need assistance to enter, re-enter, remain, or advance in the workforce. Through short-term training programs, which focus on industry recognized certifications and licenses, HVRP is committed to ensuring Veterans receive the training and support needed to secure and maintain career level jobs that pay living wages.


Enrollments Employed Average Wage

Healing Outreach Partnership for Empowerment (HOPE) is a program designed to provide outreach to homeless individuals with untreated mental illness who are living outside and are deemed most vulnerable. Veterans are located through extensive outreach efforts extended by the HOPE team. HOPE outreach efforts result in referrals into both NCServes and NCCare 360 in order to connect these individuals for their most critical needs. Eligible participants receive intensive peer support from our NC Certified Peer Support Specialists.

Mental Health Matters

Everyone's mental health can be challenged in times of uncertainty and transition. This last year we saw a rise in mental health needs among our Veterans. By partnering with providers such as Vaya Health, VA Medical Centers, Vet Centers and the Cohen Clinic we were able to connect Veterans to mental health resources. Additionally, VSC provided the community with specific mental health and wellness trainings to combat

Veteran suicide.




